What your local CVS can do for you

Each district in Devon has a Council for Voluntary Service (CVS). These exist to support the voluntary sector through help with fund raising, developing a new project, finding and managing volunteers, offering relevant training and workshops and hosting forums for people to come together and share information. Hilary Burr, CEO of North Devon Voluntary Services, explains further ...

I am very pleased to have this opportunity to tell individual churches about the work of Councils of Voluntary Service (CVS) both because I think we have a lot to offer you, and also because we value your local knowledge and commitment to the communities you serve.

I work at North Devon Voluntary Services (NDVS) but there is a separate organisation in each district council (contact details below). Six of us are partners of Devon Voluntary Action (DeVA), to enable us to share ideas and good practice, and also to have a louder voice when talking about the voluntary sector with public bodies.

Your organisation is entitled to at least three hours of FREE support (it will be more than that in some districts). If you are fundraising, we can help you find appropriate funds to

"Up Horn, Down Corn" At the time of writing, the harvest is only about 70% complete, and in a "catchy" season we continue to pray for fine weather over the next few weeks. Indications so far suggest cereal yields may be down due to the very dry spring, but grass crops have been good in both quantity and quality. Livestock prices have increased or held well and the milk price is now closer to the cost of production. TB continues to be a major heartache for our dairy farmers. apply for, and advise you about all the work you need to do before you start writing an application. Failure to provide robust evidence of the need for a project is the most common reason for applications to be turned down, and we can show you how to go about collecting that evidence. We are happy to review any application before you submit it.

We hold workshops on all aspects of fundraising which might be useful to you. Here in North Devon we hold a Fundraisers' Forum, so that people can pick up useful tips and information. Most CVSs produce a regular funding newsletter with details of grant-making trusts, new sources of funding, deadlines for applications and so on.

We also offer workshops in partnership working, recruiting and supporting volunteers, setting up a new project, dementia awareness and much more. All training can be offered on a bespoke basis as well as through our workshop programme.

We bring together community groups and voluntary organisations in Health and Wellbeing Forums to spread good practice and help people work together. This also helps us identify gaps in services, and to think collectively about how we might fill those gaps. The pressure on public spending, growing numbers of older people and a reported increase in feelings of isolation all make that task more complicated and important. I think this is an area where we could work together more effectively; you reach into every community and have a deep knowledge of what happens and who the key people are.

Another important role for us is representing the voluntary sector and advocating for the contribution it makes to all our lives. We can use the experiences and concerns of organisations working with vulnerable people to inform policy and make sure that their views are taken into account when plans – such as the NHS Sustainability and Transformation Plan – are drawn up.

I do hope this article will persuade you to forge closer links with your local CVS, and take advantage of the knowledge and expertise you will find there.
