The drivers behind the Community Unity pilot project

The Community Unity pilot project was designed to support the Citizens in Policing Programme. In particular, the overarching strategic theme of "Safe, Resilient & Connected Communities"

The Police and Crime Commissioner had a stated intent for the service to be well connected to communities, with a particular focus on those who are most vulnerable due to ethnicity, age, disability, rural or social isolation



Community Unity was a pilot project aimed at enabling this

The Aims of Community Unity

- To help build the capacity of and connectivity within each community: Between the local groups, services, volunteers and residents in order to grow their resilience, self-reliance and impact
- To raise awareness of potentially vulnerable or isolated sectors of each community and to support initiatives that seek to reduce negative impacts of these issues
- To raise awareness of Devon & Cornwall Police's "Citizens in Policing" programme and its volunteering opportunities.







Project Overview – Target Localities

- When: March 2017 November 2018
- Where: Three distinct communities within northern Devon:
- **Urban South Molton**
 - A thriving, growing Devon market town.
 - Well-connected, adjacent to A361.
- **Rural Holsworthy**

Devon & Cornwall Police

- A traditional market town
- Rural location, geographically remote.
- **Coastal Lynton and Lynmouth**
 - Tight knit community, geographically remote.
 - Tourism is the key to socio-economic well being.

Outputs and Impact?

- Three Asset Maps created
- Over 60 local people representing around 40 local community groups participated in events
- Over 140 local people attended training
- Eight local initiatives received investment from the Lets Do It fund
- Three community market stalls and over 600 promotional flyers distributed as part of the KYN campaign
